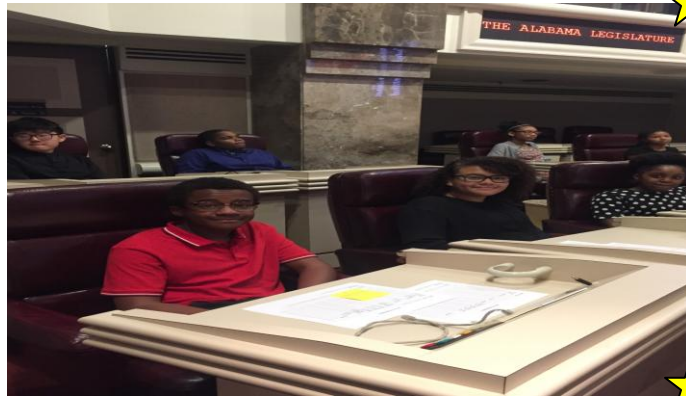

SUMMER ACTIVITIES

Are you wondering how your child should spend his or her summer days? Summer is a great time to relax and recharge, but it's also an excellent chance for children to do those things that they enjoy most: going to the movies, riding bikes, playing sports, traveling, reading books and going camping are just a few examples.



Summer Camp: Summer camps aren't just for making s'mores and going on nature hikes anymore. More and more summer camps for children are being created that have unique focuses such as cultural immersion, performing arts, wilderness skills, and more. Many children attend these programs to learn new skills or improve skills they already have. For example, if your child wants to get better at a certain sport or start to learn a new language, a summer camp can help. Camp P.R.I.D.E (Personal Responsibility In Delivering Excellence) will be held at Cramton Bowl

on June 18th in Montgomery, Alabama.
